After spending time last year reading professional books about recent research in the field of reading, studying our district data on student achievement in reading, and listening to our state's political and educational leaders stress the need for improving student achievement, we have intensified our focus on reading. While our students have consistently been performing well on tests measuring reading achievement, our district is committed to continuously improving and has taken steps to do so.

In grades K-6, we are becoming familiar with a new reading series. It has all the pieces that research indicates a strong program should have, which is called a balanced approach to literacy. Students will develop their understanding of words, both how words work (phonics) and what they mean (vocabulary). Their understanding of writing and grammar skills will be developed, as well as their reading and comprehension abilities. This program offers many resources for teachers and students to use, both in their hands and online.

Teachers spend time working with the whole class, sharing engaging and high-quality stories, developing students' vocabulary, modeling strategies and skills that are key to strong comprehension and giving students opportunities to discuss and practice. Teachers will also spend time working with small groups of students at a "just right" reading level that allows them to be challenged, using what they've learned and being able to problem-solve as they read with support from the teacher. This allows for more individual attention and support. Teachers are also able to choose from a range of materials to assess if students have learned, so they are able determine which students need more support and which need more challenge.

According to research, one of the most significant ways to impact student achievement is to allow time for teachers to collaborate with one another. Our district has worked to carve out a little time for teachers of the same grade level to meet together. This is an extremely important "first step" in being able to provide consistency in instructional expectations and assessments for our students within a grade level, and we have chosen to focus on reading as our first priority.

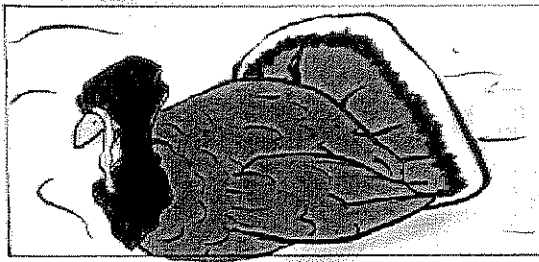
From their professional reading last year, teachers in grades 7-8 decided to collaborate to implement a Reader's Workshop approach. Each month, they choose a research-proven reading strategy, determine a student-friendly definition, and design a graphic organizer that will help teachers and students work with the strategy. The strategy is "kicked off" by the reading/language arts teachers, and then is reinforced in every content area class to provide multiple opportunities for students to practice the strategy and to see how it connects to subjects outside of reading class.

Our district is so fortunate to have talented people who are committed to educational excellence and are willing to work tirelessly to help our students achieve great things. We are excited to see our students learning and growing through our focus on reading.

## Regular Board Meeting October 17, 2011

The regular meeting of the Maquoketa Valley Board of Education was called to order by President John Zietlow at 7:00 p.m. in the Middle School Conference Room in Delhi, Iowa. All motions carried unanimously unless otherwise noted. Five board members were present. There were seven staff members present and thirteen visitors present. The agenda and consent items were approved.

In Coordinator and Principal reports, it was noted that the High School roof will need repaired. A temporary fix will be done until a more permanent repair can be done in the spring.

Maquoketa Valley teachers and administrators attended the Delaware County Professional Development Day at West Delaware on October 10<sup>th</sup>.

Steel has been ordered for the baseball/softball complex concession stand as well as the dug-out roofs. This work will be completed in the spring.

On October 21<sup>st</sup> third grade students from each center will be attending a symphony concert in Dubuque.

The high school academic awards assembly was held on October 17<sup>th</sup>. Seventeen sophomores, 23 juniors and 24 seniors were honored with academic awards this year.

A hearing was set for November 21, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of considering an early start date for the 2012-2013 school year.

The following board policies were reviewed and approved: 602.060 Special Education, 600.40 Multicultural/Gender Fair Education, 301.010 School Superintendent – Qualifications, 301.020 School Superintendent – Recruitment and Appointment, 401.040 Recruitment, Qualifications and Selection of Licensed Personnel, 407.030 Recruitment, Qualifications, Selection of Classified Personnel and 502.10 Smoking, Drinking, Drugs.

The Board approved the FY11 Special Education Modified Allowable Growth application.

One personnel recommendation was approved. Also approved were two open enrollment requests.

The Delaware County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Resolution was approved.

Certified enrollment shows a decline in roughly 15 students for 2011-2012.

Supt. Tuetken noted that board policies are now accessible through the District website. He asked all Board members to begin reviewing the 400 series.

The November regular school board meeting will be held at Earlville Elementary. The December meeting will be held at Johnston Elementary.

Erika Imler and John Zietlow took a few minutes to discuss the initial comments from the District audit which was completed in September.

On Monday, October 24<sup>th</sup>, Maquoketa Valley will host the County Board of Directors Work Session. This will begin at 6:30 p.m. Local legislators as well as Tom Downs from IASB will be in attendance.

Ann Norton updated the Board on the progress of the Mission and Vision Committee. The next meeting will take place on November 7<sup>th</sup> at 3:30.

Supt. Tuetken took a few minutes to discuss the request of reinstating the Spirit Squad for wrestling and basketball. Further discussion will take place at the November meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 p.m.



### Weather Calls

The MV Administration recommends that when we are expecting nasty weather, please listen first to the radio stations of WMT, KMCH or KDST. MV also reports their school closings and cancellations to 3 TV stations: KGAN (2), KWWL (7), and KCRG (9), but TV Channels 7 & 9 seem to have trouble getting the announcements correct. When bad weather hits, it's best to turn to the radio stations. Please DO NOT call the school. Their lines will be busy contacting personnel, other schools, bus drivers, etc.

As winter and the cold weather approaches, our building temperatures will be set from 65 to 70 degrees. Parents are encouraged to dress your children appropriately. It is perfectly acceptable for your child to wear a sweater or sweatshirt in class in order to stay comfortable.

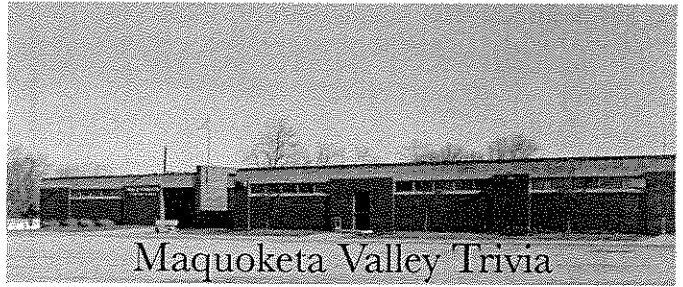
These times are the same for all three elementaries, the Middle School and High School.

**All Jr. Kindergarten. through 6th grade** conferences will be scheduled by appointment, and letters have already been sent home to parents to confirm the appointment. These grades will meet for conferences in their respective classrooms.

**The 7th & 8th graders** will also have scheduled fifteen minute conferences. Parents will be assigned to one of your child's teachers who will have all information about your child and their grades from their other classes and teachers. If you feel that you need to talk to any other teachers about your child, we will post conference schedules outside of each classroom. Therefore, if a teacher is not conferencing, feel free to talk with them. If this doesn't work we will be more than happy to have a staff member call you or set up a time to meet with you.

**High School teachers** will be set up in the High School gymnasium, and parents are invited to speak with any or all of their child's teachers at their convenience during the time allowed. High School report cards will be given to parents by the secretaries in the front foyer of the building. Any High School report cards not picked up during the conference times will be sent home with the students.

## America, Of Thee I Sing

The elementary music classes have been spending some time learning patriotic songs. We began the year with a fun favorite, "Yankee Doodle". Did you know that this song was actually sung by the British to poke fun at the Colonial soldiers' uniforms?

The next song we worked on was "America, The Beautiful". We learned that it was originally a poem by Kathryn Lee Bates and then later set to a melody composed by Samuel Ward. The Kindergarten students caught on quickly to this song with the help of the book, "America The Beautiful" which illustrated the words.

Various grades have sung the songs "You're A Grand Old Flag", "America", and "God Bless America". A favorite song for many has been "This Land Is Your Land" by Woody Guthrie.

The fourth grade class spent time learning about our national anthem, "The Star-Spangled Banner". One of the things we found out was that even though it was performed as our national anthem since the early 1800s, it did not become our official national anthem until 1931. Each fourth grade student was required to sing the first verse to "The Star-Spangled Banner", memorized.

It has been inspiring to watch and hear these students sing the patriotic music of our nation with sincerity, spirit, and pride!

## Pioneer Life

The 2nd and 3rd Graders at Johnston Elementary had the opportunity to visit a log home that was originally constructed in the 1840s. Pete and Cindy Hall recently refurbished the log home with the help of an Amish carpenter. The log home is located just west of Monticello.

Mrs. Hall taught the students many things about the every day life of a pioneer, beginning with the rising of the sun. There was no electricity, so daylight was used wisely. A pioneer child would have many chores to do, such as carrying water from the creek, doing animal chores, and helping in the kitchen. There was always work to be done.

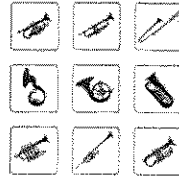
Students were fascinated by the "old-fashioned" way of doing things. The cabin was filled with all of the furniture and tools that pioneers would have used. Cindy did a great job of explaining how each item was made, and why it was important. A highlight of the log home tour for the students was the upstairs. They couldn't imagine sleeping four or five people in a small bed, nor the fact that pioneer children had very few toys. And students are still talking about only being able to take a bath one or two times in a winter!

This short trip offered students a background of knowledge that will be helpful when teaching units about the pioneers and pioneer life. Thank you to the Hall family for preserving a piece of the past and inviting us to visit.

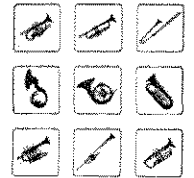

### Third Grade Attends Orchestra Concert

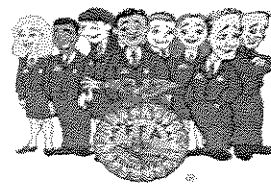



## REAL LIFE ACADEMY FOR SENIORS

On Thursday, November 3, Maquoketa Valley and Ed-Co seniors will have the opportunity to participate in the Real Life Academy at Maquoketa Valley High School. The Real Life Academy is sponsored by the Delaware County School to Work Committee and introduces high school seniors to the real world of day to day finance--making choices, paying bills and dealing with whatever "fate" may hand you.

Participants are assigned one of their chosen professions, their marital status, and whether or not they have children and/or pets. They are also given their monthly salary and a credit card with no outstanding balance. Most students also have a student loan payment. Students are given a checkbook and register and are required to pay taxes, buy or rent housing, purchase vehicles, insurance, fuel, groceries, clothing, make investments and charitable contributions, pay for child care, pay the phone bill, utilities, etc.

Local business people will be at tables that the students visit to pay for their monthly expenses. There will also be a "Fate" table, where students draw two cards of chance. Sometimes these are positive or they might be negative. There is also a roaming nurse and police officer who hand out fate cards. In order to exit the Real Life Academy students must meet with a banker who reviews the check register to make sure that the student is on track and has between \$0 and \$200 left in their account.

This is the fourth year for the Real Life Academy in Delaware County and it is an excellent opportunity for seniors to experience what budgeting is like in the real world. For more information please contact Barb Hollinrake at the high school at 563-922-2091.

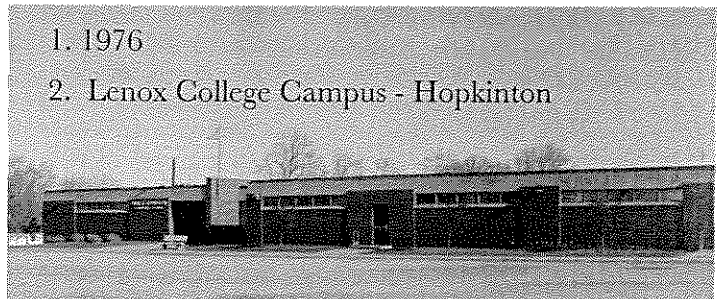

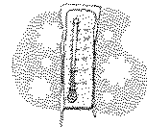
