The boys finished 2024 with a battle against perennial powerhouse North Linn and lost 65-34, but when the new year started, the Wildcats remained a force in the Tri-Rivers with wins over Central City and East Buchanan.

MV traveled to Central City last

Friday night and won a nailbiter, 70-68.

Brady Wall led in scoring with 30 points followed by Anderson Holtz with 25. Ty Hoeger added five, and Lukas Chesnut and Preston Salow each had four. Dylan Knipper and Trevor Grimm added one.

Freethrows were a factor for MV as they shot 79%, making 23 of 29.

Wall led in rebounds with seven. Hoeger had six. Holtz had three assists and a steal. Knipper, Hoeger and Chesnut each had a block.

"We needed to execute a specific game plan against Central City to stop one of their players and that takes a ton of focus to be able to do that," noted Coach Conner. "When we commit and have all five guys doing their jobs, we are able to execute against anyone, but we are really trying to get the consistency pieces put together as we move forward in the season."

Tuesday night the Wildcats defeated East Buchanan 64-53.

Three players were in double digits for scoring: Wall with 22, Knipper with 11 and Tate Intorf with 10. Hoeger added five, and Salow, Holtz and Eli Dougherty each added four. Chesnut and Grimm had two points apiece.

Knipper's 10 rebounds gave him a double-double for the night. He also had six steals and three assists. Wall had five rebounds, an assists and two steals.

"Both of our last two games have been really good learning experiences for us," stated Coach Conner. "When we really focus on the details of offense and defense and play under control, we have been able to do some really, really good things. There have been some times in each game that are a little bit head scratching, but that is all part of the learning process. These examples have given us a really good opportunity to point things out on film and continue to try to make the necessary adjustments."

Coach Conner claims his team has shown consistency as they move into the second half of the season: "We have potential to be able to make a deep postseason run and be able to show our improvement against the teams in our conference that we play two times. We will continue to work in practice to put ourselves in the situations that we need to improve upon and see where it takes us."

Last night the team hosted Central of Elkader. Details will be in the next issue.
